<p style="text-align: center;">Integrity</p> <p>The children are encouraged to consider their place in the world and the impact that they can have by making small changes.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Ambition</p> <p>Respectful sharing of opinions and reflections e.g. ‘I agree with...I disagree with..’ Children working as a team when they become a tribe and developing relevant skills. Communication of key learning to the wider community (sharing assembly/celebration event/local supermarket) so that they are able to identify how to make a positive contribution.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Respect</p> <p>The children will explore the impact of palm oil production on the island of Sumatra and the wider world. They will consider the impact on the farmers, people, animals and global companies. They will explore companies such as Burger King who are beginning to make a more positive contribution to the wider world by not using palm oil. They will also learn about a different culture and way of living.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Growth Mindset</p> <p>Children are encouraged to question and share their opinions through LTE style sessions Thought provoking questions given which will make the children struggle, query and debate – teachers to facilitate this development e.g. What will happen if we lose our rainforests? If we don’t use palm oil, what should we use? What will the impact be if we use X? Becoming a tribe and working in a team will promote resilience, determination and perseverance.</p>	<p style="text-align: center;">Critical Thinking (Key learning questions)</p> <p style="text-align: center;">How is palm oil production impacting the island of Sumatra?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Why is palm oil used? Why are rainforests important?
